THE GREAT GARGANI Edouardo Gargani, at age forty, is the world's champion of three cushion billiards in "fancy" shots. He was born, raised and still resides in Buenos Aires, Argentina, with his wife and two small girls.

BUENOS AIRES, city and Federal all bistrict, the capital of Argen-ina, situated on the w. bank of the kio de la Plata, about 50-miles from the Atlantic Ocean, I is the largest city in the Sou-therm Hemisphere, the chief port of South America, and the dustrial center of Argentina. Built on a grassy plain, about 65-feet above sea level, most of Buenos Aires is laid out in a pattern of regular squares, The principal throughfare, Avenida de Mayo, is 120-feet wide, and Arenida 9-de Julio (9th: 4 July) is even wider. Parue 3-de Arded parks in Baenos Aires. The notable buldings of the city in-clude a cathedral, dating from 1752, and containing the tomb of the national hero Jose de San Martin; the Presidential palace; the mational Library; the Muni-cipal Museum; and the Colon Opera House. Educational Library; the Muni-cipal Museum; and the Colon Opera House. Educational in-situates, and many public and private schools. The city has an excellent atti-

ficial harbor, with modern port facilities extending for 5-miles along the water front. More than two thirds of commerce of Arg-entina passes through the port, entina passes through the port, which also serves as a commer-cial distributing center for parts of Bolivia, Paraguay. Cattle and cattle products, wheat, and woof, are the principal export; the prin-cipal imports include machinery and vehicles, iron and iron pro-ducts, fuels and lubricants, and

ducts, fuels and lubricants, and textiles. About one third of the industrial industrial establishments of Arg-entina are located in Buenos Aires. The city has the largest refrigeration plant in the world. Close to 50-percent of all Argen-tine industrial workers earn their livelihoods in the city's mat-packing, flour-milling, tex-tile, foodstuff, beverage, to-bacco, metel-manufacturing, and electric-power plant.
